Ready, Set, Push!!

Neighborhood festivals like the Hotdish Revolution, Windy Fest (Windom Park Festival) and the Audubon Park Wing-Ding are well-known Northeast traditions. But what about the Waite Park Push Cart Derby?

On Saturday, September 12, Waite Park will hold its 7th annual Push Cart Derby & Fall Festival from 11 am – 2 pm.

Waite Park Council Director, Mary Farnham, was put in charge of organizing the first push cart derby back in 2009 for Waite Park - a hybrid of the soap box derbies, sponsored by the Northeast Minneapolis Arts Association (NEMAA) that raced down Norwegian Hill until 2006.

According to Mary, the purpose of a pushcart derby was to bring together the spirit of all things NE. "Something that tugged at your heart. We needed a crown jewel to draw the event," she said. "It is different from the other NE festivals."

Mary did some research and tracked down Kyle Fokken, a Northeast artist, who was involved in the soap box derby events sponsored by the NEMAA. Kyle used to coordinate events and teach classes on building soap box derbies and provided Mary with a wealth of information for organizing a push cart derby. Mary refers to him as the grandfather of the push cart derby.

At the first derby in 2009, Waite Park featured a celebrity push cart and invited members of the Roller Derby Girls to participate. There were about nine carts the first year.

"It was new and exciting. No one else was doing it. The carts were pretty simple to make plus there were no major funding needs like with the soap box derby. (shutting down streets, police, etc.)," Mary said.

At the derby, carts are pushed by teams across Waite Park's grassy field in a series of races. Although there are no hills to maneuver down, it has all the elements of an old fashioned race that encourages team spirit and community.

The push carts are often decorated in some way and there is a prize available for the most creative push cart. In the past, the NE Urban 4H Club has created carts resembling Moby Dick and a Viking Ship.

Mary admits it has been difficult to get residents interested in racing their own push cart. The catch: they have to build a cart. People are discouraged by that. This would be a good event for youth groups but she points out that many talented youth do not know how to pound a nail these days.

Directions for building the push cart and the entry forms are available on the Waite Park Community Council website at www.waiteparkneighborhood.org.

Using the instructions on the website, Mary built one herself in about eight hours. Unlike a soap box, it does not need a brake.

If you are interested in participating but don't want to build a cart, contact the Waite Park Community Council to see if an extra one might be available.

Community groups like Northeast Royalty and Edison High School students volunteer each year to help with the event. Sponsors of the event include Bywood East Health Care, Cub Foods, Culvers and Ready Meats.

As in past years, the festival will feature food, entertainment, kids' games, a bouncy house, and a silent auction. Waite Park Community Garden will also hold a plant exchange. Trophies and \$400 in cash prizes are available for the derby winners. All proceeds of the festival will go to Waite Park Community Council.

Mary would like to see the event grow with more carts racing. Last year only six carts participated. 10 -12 carts competing would make things interesting. She hopes various community groups, organizations even local brew pubs might want to join in on the fun. Participants do not need to be from Northeast.

"It's slow going," Mary said. "I hope it gets some legs," Mary said about the derby. "It's always about the community for me when the people come together, race, and have fun. There's a passion around it."

The AIA is the professional organization of architects in Minnesota. AIA architects are licensed and required to take continuing education courses to keep current with laws, codes, and new materials.

Latest on the Parks by Nic Baker

Liz Wielinski, Chairperson of the Park and Recreation Board, describes her position as “very challenging but lots of fun.” She describes a number of developments in the park system.

The main news about Audubon Park is the “Rec Plus” program. In this day-care program, parents drop off their kids in the morning. The park staff takes the kids to school, then pick them up when school closes. The kids then return to the park, where they engage in various activities led by licensed day-care providers before being picked up by the parents. Other news about Audubon is a new pool table and foosball table, both partially funded by ANA.

There are no plans for any renovations or additions to our park building, since it is in somewhat better shape than many others in the system. Also, much of the board’s resources are directed at pools and playground equipment, since these amenities can’t be used unless up to code. Beyond that, increasing construction costs limit how far the budget can be stretched for renovations and even minor repairs.

The board has obtained new properties on the river and signed a purchase agreement on August 4th. Liz states that the properties will be developed once the board has obtained the remaining properties, at which point there will be a park along several miles of the river.

The board is engaged in major planning activities, both for the short-term (relatively speaking) and the long term: the next 50 years! For the latter, Jill Davis, former Minneapolis School Board Chair, is chairing a citizens’ advisory committee. The committee starts meeting in September and will welcome public comments. For more information, Google “Rec Quest Minneapolis.”

“Bike Minneapolis” will take place on September 20; riders can select the distance they are most comfortable with.

There are also developments at nearby parks:

- The playground equipment at Windom Park playground will be officially opened on September 22.
- Similarly, the department completed renovations of the Waite Park pool in June.
- Construction has started on the Highview Park playground.

NEWS FROM NE MIDDLE SCHOOL & Pillsbury Elementary

Meet Vernon Rowe

Vernon Rowe said that he is still on a learning curve as he begins the school year as the new principal at Northeast Middle School (NEMS.) Finishing off last year as Vice Principal for Sanford, Rowe comes to NEMS with positive energy and a good sense of humor.

He is a man with 22 years experience as a teacher and administrator in the Minneapolis Public Schools, and is ready to welcome each student at NEMS with the best education possible.

"I'm a student-centered administrator," he explained. "I look at students as my customers." Before going into education, Rowe worked as a marketing manager and finds similarities between the corporate world and education.

"Our job is to bridge gaps," he said. One way NEMS will do that is through access to technology. Every student will be given a chrome book this school year.

"We want to have our kids connected to technology. That technology moves the curriculum and moves the kid in such a way that there becomes a love and desire to learn," he said.

NEMS concentrates not only on the academic skills, but on the social, emotional connection of each student as well. The objective is to develop the whole student.

The International Baccalaureate (IB program) is aimed at doing those types of things. "It's a large call to a mission but that's what our mission statement is – that we develop the whole kid."

Rowe believes Northeast is a good school with great teachers and students. But every school has the ability to become better at what it does.

What one person may see as a challenge at NEMS, Rowe sees as an opportunity.

"How do I make everybody feel that they belong at NEMS? 65% of the students come from the North side of Minneapolis and many of the kids that do live in NE Minneapolis choose not to come to NEMS." He said that is very sad.

Being at one of the most diverse schools in the Minneapolis Public School system, Rowe said, "This is a growth opportunity." "We get to share our differences as well as our similarities. And with an understanding of those things everybody grows. How can we address this for all our kids and their families? Kids already know how to do this. It's the adults who need to jump on board," he said.

The community has impressed him with their support of the school but what he wants to see is more of the community sending their kids to the school.

"Folks really come in and they support the school in the sense

of service but I want them to support the school in the sense that they send their kids. I want them to hold me accountable and to trust me with the wellbeing and the education of their kid," he said. "We want to build a culture that is student centered, student friendly and student enjoyable."

His basic message to the community may sound like a marketing slogan but it gets his message across clearly: "Love the service, send the kids. I'd love to have them give us a try".

Seniors on the Go Program is Going and Now Expanding

Many may know Waite Park resident, Rita Deyo, as the energy behind Waite Park's Senior on the Go Program.

The program started around 1997 when Rita who was already retired and a volunteer at Waite Park asked the park director, "You have so many nice programs for the kids. Why don't we do something for the seniors?"

According to Rita the program's goal was, "to introduce our seniors to the silent history of our state. And that's what we did," she said.

Planning these day trips involved sitting together with the Waite Park director and brainstorming ideas. Reservations for bus, lunch and admission were handled by the park. Rita would call the seniors on their list personally which in the beginning was between 15-20 people. Because of the success of the program and through word of mouth, that number grew to between 65-70 in the NE, St Anthony, and Columbia Heights area.

"People were so darn nice," she said about everyone she called. "We believe in community and wanted everyone to feel welcome. I like the people. I wanted them to see all these wonderful things right within our state boundaries," she said.

A variety of interesting trips were planned over the years including Duluth's Tall Ships, Hinckley's Fire Museum, and Kellogg's LARK Toy Factory.

"I love the opportunity to see places that are not on tourist's lists," she said. In Mantorville, Minnesota, outside of Rochester, for example, they visited the Hubbell House which was once a stagecoach stop.

"There is also a one room school house exactly like it was and doesn't look like museum," she said. "Things you don't expect fascinates me."

Seniors pay their own lunch, bus transportation and admission to the event. Most of the time the program was self-supporting. Trip cost would be as inexpensive as possible and did not duplicate events scheduled by other organizations.

It was up to the seniors to make the program a success. Holly Arnold-Rains, who is assisting with the program now said, "We don't go shopping and we don't go to casinos."

Rita admitted that there were times when a trip did not go as planned. One year they were returning back from Duluth and there was a great deal of construction. The bus returned two hours late. "We laugh when things don't go right," she said.

"Seniors are not prudes," she said and added, "we talk a lot on the way and doze a lot on the way back."

The Seniors on the Go program is one of the largest and most active senior programs in Minneapolis and it is now expanding. In addition to future day trips, the Seniors on the Go group will be introducing a new passport program encouraging participants to visit four different Minneapolis parks (Sibley, Audubon, Keewaydin, and Creekview) which will offer Senior luncheons on the second Tuesday of the month. Call Brian at Waite Park at 612-370-4770 to find out more information and to sign up to be on their list for future trips and luncheons.

According to Rita, the Seniors on the Go is a good program because it helps seniors stay active. "The brain cells don't curl up and die and you're stimulating their mind. You are helping them stay strong mentally."
